Regis CEO, Jim Beyer, recently visited the School of Rural Medicine at Charles Sturt University (CSU) in Orange, to make a donation to support training for more rural doctors.

The Doctor of Medicine degree is offered jointly between Charles Sturt and the Western Sydney University.

They aim to tackle the shortage of doctors in regional and rural Australia by training

medical students to become doctors in rural settings.

The Regis donation was a very practical one, providing for two TruCric models and an Advanced Epidural and Lumbar Puncture Model. The models will enable students to

practise procedures such as epidurals and lumbar punctures, in conditions as close to 'real life' as possible.
